

## "Shine the Light" Rally Unites Parishes and Medical Center



About 50 people participated in a "Shine the Light on Domestic Violence" Walk on Oct 18 from St. Gianna parish (a merger of Queen of Martyrs and St. Bernadette) in Evergreen Park. Faculty from St. Xavier University School of Nursing cohosted the event. The crowd walked solemnly around the campus of nearby Franciscan HealthCare Little Company Medical Center. As they held candles and prayed, their message was clear: end domestic violence.



# Parish Activities in October



## Northside Parishes Join for Educational Evening

Domestic Violence Ministries from parishes of Holy Cross (Deerfield), St. Patrick (Lake Forest) and Our Lady of Perpetual Help (Glenview) held an evening on domestic violence and teens.



Commander Ron Wolflick, from Illinois Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force summarized



the rapidly expanding misuses of the internet to target youth. He emphasized the rapidly expanding crime of youth "sextortion," a virtual epidemic in Illinois, which has dramatically increased suicide risk!

Attorney Jeff Kasten, Chair of Holy Cross's Salt & Light Social Justice Ministry, summarized Illinois statutes that define the

increasingly common crimes against teens and youth that are variations of domestic violence.

Dr. Michael Graham, leader of the Holy Cross DV Ministry, said, "We will utilize much of what we learned to develop educational approaches for enhanced awareness among parents and teens in our parish. We want parents and teens to understand the parameters of healthy vs. unhealthy relationships. Much of this information will be quite exportable to other parishes throughout the Archdiocese."

#### **Black Catholic Women Rally to Stop Domestic Violence**

On October 19, 25 members from several churches gathered in prayer at St. Katharine Drexel Parish to rally and walk against domestic violence. Fr. Paul Whittington, pastor at St. Katharine, prayed for survivors and their supporters. Rev. Gwendolyn Moore, Trinity United



Church of Christ Social Justice Ministry, presented information. Evangelist Cynthia Fulton from Praise Alive Christian Center offered encouraging remarks before participants walked seven blocks between 91st and 87th on Stony Island. The seven blocks signify how many attempts on average a survivor leaves their abuser before staying separated.

The event was sponsored by Catholic Charities Domestic Violence Services and Black Catholic Women Say No to Domestic Violence, an initiative developed under ACDVO which in 2019 organized African

American parishes on the south and west sides of Chicago to respond jointly to domestic violence. Casa Esperanza and Rita's Recovery Room provided resources to participants.







## Pope Francis: Stop Violence Against Women

On November 9, 2023, Pope Francis called violence against women a "poisonous weed" that must be eradicated. "In too many places and too many situations, women are put in the background. They are considered 'inferior,' objects; and when a person is reduced to a thing, she no longer sees her dignity; she is considered just property that can be used in any way and even killed."



To combat the violence, the pope said, one must go to the roots, which

"are cultural and mental and grow in the dirt of prejudice, possession and injustice." The media, he said, "still play an ambiguous role" by championing women's rights sometimes but also continuously glamorizing "hedonism and consumerism, whose models, both male and female, follow the criteria of success, self-assertion, competition and the power to attract and dominate the other." "Where there is domination, there is abuse," Francis said. "Love does not demand prisoners."

People of goodwill cannot not remain indifferent or silent when so many women are suffering violence, abuse and exploitation, he said. An added consideration for Catholics, he said, is knowing that "from the heart and flesh of a woman, salvation entered the world." "How we treat women, in all her dimensions, reveals our level of humanity." Francis said.
