IMMIGRATION PARISH COORDINATOR

An Immigration Parish Coordinator (IPC) serves a vital role towards fulfilling the mission to "welcome the stranger." IPCs are committed to work on behalf of immigrants and immigration issues in the context of Catholic social teaching. An IPC is a volunteer lay person who coordinates efforts in education/conversion, advocacy/ solidarity, and empowerment/accompaniment with the native-born congregations of their parish.

IPCs serve as a liaison between their parish and the Archdiocese of Chicago's Immigration Ministry.

QUALIFICATIONS

- Committed to work on behalf of immigrants and immigration issues
- Familiar with Catholic social teaching
- Appointed or approved by their pastor

EDUCATION AND CONVERSION

- Ensure Immigration Ministry ads and/or announcements are printed in the church bulletin
- Offer speakers, forums, or an immigrant immersion experience to educate parishioners about the immigrant experience (e.g., visit day worker corner, meet a Dreamer, visit a Pastoral Migratoria parish, etc.)
- Attend the annual IPC formation gathering and other vicariate/cluster meetings

ADVOCACY AND SOLIDARITY

- Stay informed on current immigrant issues and legislation at the local, state, and federal levels (e.g., deportation, DACA)
- Organize parishioners to participate in advocacy actions in collaboration with the Immigration Ministry (e.g., postcard campaigns, visit to legislators, voter registration)
- Recruit parishes to participate in the annual Posada for immigration reform in downtown Chicago (during Advent), National Migration Week Mass (early January), and the Keep Hope Alive annual fundraising benefit (spring)

EMPOWERMENT AND ACCOMPANIMENT

- Organize parishioners to visit the Friday interfaith prayer vigil at the Broadview detention center
- Collaborate on an event or meeting with a local immigrant parish or Pastoral Migratoria parish
- Participate in the annual Warm Coat, Warm Heart Drive that collects coats, sweat shirts for men held in detention centers

BY THE NUMBERS

127 native-born congregations have representation by Immigration Parish Coordinators

200 local high school and university students participated in youth/young adult immersion

6 Hispanic and **6** native-born parishes celebrated together in "Immersion Posadas"

1,129 coats were collected by **12** native-born parishes and delivered to the Broadview Detention Center and other detention centers in the midwest
