Love in Action Casts Out Fear: Founding Board Members Alleviate Student Loan Debt

Founding Board Members address Volunteers' student loans with new grant fund

Phil and Jean Addante are no strangers to Amate House. The couple from Park Ridge, IL have been involved with the organization since 1984 when they began their service as Founding Board Members. From Jean's involvement as a member of the Amate Magic Committee and assistance with the interior design of the three community houses to Phil's service as the organization's first Volunteer recruiter and his continued assistance as a counselor for the Volunteers, this couple has been a constant and forward driving force for Amate House since the very beginning.

It comes as no surprise that this generous couple has taken the initiative to start the "Founders Grant for Loan Forgiveness" fund. This \$500 grant, established to aid current Amate House Volunteers with their remaining student loans, will be granted to one Volunteer this spring. All Volunteers are given equal opportunity to apply for the grant, and Founding Board Members will determine the grant recipient by reviewing short essays written by the Volunteers.

Phil Addante first got involved when Ken Brucks, a Founder of Amate House, enlisted Phil to assist him with interviewing candidates for the organization's first Executive Director. It was then that Ken asked Phil to be on the Founding Board of Directors. Shortly after, Jean became involved with Amate House when the first community house was established at a former convent at Old St. Pat's Church in Chicago. She shared her gifts and talents in interior design to make the first volunteer house a home.

When asked about his role at Amate House in the early days, Phil shared "It was a real hand-to-mouth operation. There were only seven Volunteers in that first year, and we cooked and prepared meals for the Volunteers during the organization's infancy stage. I was always very impressed with the Volunteers and moved by their faith, inspiration, and vitality. Their persevering spirit really encouraged the early board and staff to keep moving forward."

The "Founders Grant for Loan Forgiveness" comes at a crucial time for current and prospective Amate House Volunteers. In 2014, CVN, the Catholic Volunteer Network was not awarded federal funding from the Corporation for National and Community Service. This federal funding had made the AmeriCorps Segal Education Award possible for all CVN member programs.

Amate House, a long-time CVN member program, has benefited greatly from the ability to offer AmeriCorps status to current Volunteers, and the education award allowed individuals to put federal loans in forbearance during their year of service with Amate House. After successful completion of a term of service, the education award also granted Volunteers the ability to utilize a small grant to pay off existing student loans or to put toward future educational endeavors.

Because of the Addante’s close involvement with Amate House, the news of this loss of funding spurred them to action. With the cost of higher education still on the rise, the couple recognized the Volunteers’ need for assistance in paying off their student loans.

“There are lots of other young adults out there in the same state,” says Jean regarding the high amounts of student loan debt that millennials are dealing with. “Creating this grant fund focused on loan forgiveness will help the Amate House Volunteers move forward with their lives, so they can continue helping others.”

When asked about why the couple keep helping at Amate House over the past thirty-two years, Jean shares, “It was a real interest for us watching the program grow and the progress being made. The interest of the Volunteers started to grow and deepen as the years went on, and it was very exciting to see more Volunteers coming on board.”

Phil adds, “For me, personally, it was an opportunity for me to give back to the church community of Chicago. Early on, I was helped by a priest mentor, a dear friend of mine, and I kept that in mind. It’s always been my philosophy to try to promote the best in every individual that I encounter and work with, and helping the Volunteers and Amate House has been a perfect opportunity to do just that.”

Although Amate House is entering a time of transition, both Phil and Jean see a promising future. Phil says, “I think the diversity of the Volunteers is very encouraging. I hope Amate House continues to bring more individuals of different backgrounds into the program. We need to encourage diversity into the church community and Archdiocese as a whole, and Amate House has been a great example of the value of diversity. I also think, professionally speaking, that these young adults show a uniqueness in their desire to reach out and give to others.”

Phil continues, “It’s a countercultural view of what we usually see when we think of millennials, who tend to be labeled as a generation that expects a lot to be given of them. However, these millennial Volunteers are selflessly giving back, and that’s very important.”

Jean hopes for the organization to remain the same as it was since the day she first heard of Amate House. She says, “I hope the Volunteers will continue on as wonderfully as they have in the past, and as more Volunteers get involved that they can expand to other regions of the city. The presence of Amate House and the love of the Volunteers is needed in the northwest side just as much as it’s needed in the south side or the inner city.”

“It’s been an honor and privilege to be a part of Amate House for all these years. It’s amazing... It’s something we helped start, and it’s still going,” reflects Phil.

The Addantes hope that other supporters will consider giving to the “Founders Grant for Loan Forgiveness” so that the grant can be offered to more than just one Volunteer in the years to come.


